

### **Pension Application for Charles Angier**

W.20609 (Widow: Elizabeth) Married 1784, Charles died 1816.

Letter in folder dated March 31, 1936, written in response to an inquiry.

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War records of John Angier, 1731-1793 Southboro, Massachusetts; Charles Angier, 1752-1816; Joshua Blood, 1744 who married 1767 Keziah Jeweth; Samuel Brewer 1716 of Framingham who married Martha Bent; Daniel Goodnow 1726-1818; Jonathan Jefts 1734-1817; Enoch Lawrence 1710 who died in Mason, N. H.; Joseph Lawrence, 1749-1825 of Groton, Massachusetts; Thomas Temple, 1739 who married in 1760; Andrew VanHorn 1750-1828, and Robert Waugh who married 1-28-1765 in New Ipswich, New Hampshire, Elizabeth White of Townsend, Massachusetts.

A search of the Revolutionary War pension records has been made and no claims found based upon service of John Angier, David Blood, Samuel Brewer, Joseph Lawrence and Robert Waugh as described above, nor of any Joshua Blood, Daniel Goodnow, Jonathan Jefts, Enoch Lawrence, Solomon Newton, Thomas Temple and Andrew VanHorn. The record of Charles Angier has been found and is given herein as shown in the papers on file in pension claim, W.20609.

Charles Angier, while a resident of Southboro, Worcester County, Massachusetts, enlisted as private in Captain Josiah Fay's company, Colonel Jonathan Ward's Massachusetts regiment, marched on the Lexington Alarm, then to Boston, was in the battle of Bunker Hill and continued until expiration of service of eight months. He re-enlisted late in December 1775, as private under the same captain and colonel, remained in the vicinity of Boston until after the evacuation by the British in March 1776, during which time he acted as waiter to said Captain Josiah Fay, marched from there to New London, Connecticut, thence to New York and was in the battles of Long Island and white plains and continued to serve until January 1777. Charles Angier enlisted in August 1777 and served six days as private in Captain Seth Newton's company, Colonel Whitney's Massachusetts regiment at the time of the Bennington alarm.

The soldier married December 23, 1784 in Southboro, Massachusetts, Elizabeth Newton; the names of her parents are not shown nor any relationship to the above noted Captain Seth Newton stated.

Charles Angier died January 3, 1816 in Southboro, Massachusetts. The date and place of his birth, and the names of his parents are not shown.

Elizabeth Angier, the soldier's widow, was allowed pension on account of his service in service in the Revolutionary War on her application executed September 17, 1838, at which time she resided in Southboro, Massachusetts; she was then aged seventy-five years.

No reference was made to children of Charles Angier and his wife, Elizabeth.

In 1838, Willard Newton was a Justice of the Peace in Southboro, Massachusetts; one Larkin Newton was also a resident of that place then. No relationship between these persons and the soldier's widow, Elizabeth, was stated.
