

Pension Application for William Badlam or Badlo

W.15821 (Widow: Elizabeth) Elizabeth stated that she was married to William sometime before the war began and that he died March 12, 1833.

Letter in folder dated October 20, 1922, written in response to an inquiry.

In reply to your letter received September 21, 1922, you are advised that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W.15821, it appears that William Badlam or Bedlo enlisted January 1776 in Sherburne, Massachusetts and served as a private for one year in Captain Bullard's Company Colonel Whitcomb's Regiment, Massachusetts Troops.

In January 1777 he enlisted and served until in 1781 in Captain Elisha Brewer's Company, Colonel Samuel Brewer's Regiment. Was in battles of Hubbardton and taking of Burgoyne. He was then transferred on account of ill health and served as Sergeant until June 1783 in Captain Hill's company, Colonel Nichola's Invalid Regiment, Massachusetts Troops. He was allowed pension.

In 1818 he was living in Champlain, Clinton County, New York, aged seventy years. He died March 12, 1833.

On July 8, 1771 in Newton, Massachusetts he married Elizabeth Cook of said Newton, born July 18, 1748.

She was allowed pension on her application executed July 1, 1837 while a resident of Champlain, New York. She died July 3, 1838.

They had one child before the War began, name not stated. In 1828 a son Uriah, and in 1837 a son Charles are mentioned, the latter living in Champlain, New York at said date. There is no further family data on file.
