

Pension Application for Henry Barmore or Baremore

R.493 (Widow: Elizabeth) Henry died in 1831.

On this 29th day of June A.D. 1855, personally appeared before me, a Justice of the Peace within and for the County and State aforesaid, Elizabeth Baremore, aged 93, a president of Clarkstown in the State of New York, who being duly sworn according to law declares, that she is the widow of Henry Baremore, deceased, who was a Drummer in the Company commanded by Captain [Curry?] Smith in a Regiment of New York Militia commanded by Colonel A. Hawk Hay in the War of the Revolution. That her said husband volunteered at Clarkstown in the State of New York about the year 1777 as a "Minuet [Minute] Man" for an indefinite term; and continued in actual service in said War, for the term of more than fourteen days. She further declares that she was married to the said Henry Baremore at Haverstraw in the State of New York on the 28th day of February A.D. 1781, by one David Burns a Clergyman; that her name before her said marriage was Elizabeth Huffman. That he said husband died at Clarkstown in the State of New York on the 8th day of February A.D. 1831, and that she is now a widow, no public or private record of said marriage and death, exists to her knowledge. She makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the Bounty Land to which she may be entitled under the "Act approved March 3d 1855." (Signed with her mark) Elizabeth Baremore.

On this fourth day of January 1845 personally appeared before me Jonathan Yeomans of said City aged 81 years, being duly sworn deposed and saith that in the Revolutionary War, he was a militia man in the County of Orange N. York in Col. Hays Regt. and resided at Clarkstown, and this deponent further says that in said war he was well acquainted with Henry Barmore, who also resided in the same county and that he distinctly recollects that he was in the service with him in the Militia of the County, in the said war—in the Company of Capt. Smith. That said Barmore was a Drummer and was an older man than this deponent and that it was in the year 1779—that he and this deponent was in service together as above stated, and to the best of this deponent's recollection said Barmore was at that time a [?] of family. And this deponent further says that he now distinctly recollects of having understood in the said War that the said Barmore was taken prisoner. And this deponent further says that Henry Barmore died a great many years ago, and left a widow who has not been again married but yet continues his widow and now resides in the County of Rockland N.
