## Pension Application for Ebenezer Bartlett

Letter in folder dated January 10, 1939, written in response to an inquiry.

The record of the only Ebenezer Bartlett of Pennsylvania, that is found on the Revolutionary War records of this office is furnished you herein as found in the papers on file in pension claim, S.39957, based upon his military service in that war.

The date and place of birth and the names of the parents of Ebenezer Bartlett are not shown.

Ebenezer Bartlett enlisted in White Plains, New York, June 9, 1778, served as private in Captain Daniel Shay's Company, Colonel Rufus Putnams, Fifth Massachusetts Regiment, and in Captain Joshua Benson's Company in the Light Infantry, under Colonels Joseph Vose and Rufus Putnam; was in the battle of Stony Point and in several skirmishes; was wounded in the leg in a skirmish near East Chester, New York he received two other wounds, nature not stated, and was discharged July 14, 1781.

He lived in Sunbury, Delaware County, Ohio, prior to 1818.

He was allowed pension on his application executed May 1, 1818, at which time he was a resident of Tunkhannock, Luzerne County, Pennsylvania, and aged about sixty-two years.

Soldier's wife died in May 1819 at the home of one Zebulon Marcy, Jr., her name, age are not stated and there are no further information in regard to her.

In 1820 soldier lived in said Luzerne County, with his son-in-law, his name and the name of his wife are not given. There are no further family data.

The solder, Ebenezer Bartlett died April 24, 1830, place not stated.
