

Pension Application for Edward Bavor or Beavor

S.35178 (Sergeant in the 2d or New York Artillery Regiment from 6th January 1781 until June 9 1783.)
State of Kentucky

On this second day of July 1821, personally appeared in open court being a Court of Record, expressly made so by the laws of the State which created it, for the County of Fleming in the State aforesaid, Edward Bavor aged about Sixty years residing in the said county of Fleming in said State who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows first in Col. Wemps Regt, Capt. Groter's Company in the New York Regiment and afterwards in the 2nd New York Artillery Regt. commanded by Col. John Lamb in Capt. Bliss' company until he resigned after which the company was commanded by Capt. Swartout as more fully set forth in my original declaration dated about the 20th day of July 1818, as per a pension certificate now in my possession No. 10546, dated the 13th day of May 1819 & I do solemnly swear that I was resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 & that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my property of any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War" passed on the 18th day of March 1818 & that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities contracts or debts due to me now have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed & by me subscribed viz.

I don't own any species of property or money or moneys worth on earth except a few cheap coarse wearing clothes.

The said Edward Bavor further states on oath that he is a common labourer, that three years last may he lost his wife, leaving four children three girls & one boy. The oldest of which at this time is about eleven years. The youngest not quite four.

That his children is all placed in separate families with strangers, his son Asa about nine years he has bound to Apollos C. Dobryn of Fleming County KY to learn the sadling business. That he himself has for some years passed lived in the family of said Dobryns as a labourer, that he enjoys tolerable health for one of his age except much effected with the Rheumatic pains, particularly in his hips.

That he never possessed much property. That his wife was in a helpless way a long time before her death & after she died he divided what little he owned between his neighbours who had waited on his wife in her sickness and those who took the children since which he has not owned any property of any kind but as before stated his labour being scarcely sufficient to keep him in food and raiment and that he is in such indigent circumstances as to be unable to support himself without the assistance of his country.
