Pension Application for Charles Bishop

The Petition of Charles Bishop Humbly Sheweth

That your petitioner on the sixth day of August one thousand and seven hundred and seventy seven received a wound in his right arm by the enemies to the United States, he then being a Private in Captain Christian House's Company Co. Jacob Klock Regiment of Militia, in Oriskany Battle near Fort Schuyler, in the State of New York, which would rendered your petitioner unable to labour or maintaining himself or family.

Your petitioner therefore humbly pray that your honorable bodies would take his deplorable condition into consideration and grant him such relieve as in your wisdom shall seem meet, and you petitioner as in duty bound shall ever pray.

It also appears from the records of this Bureau that Charles Bishop a resident of Montgomery County, New York, applied for pension in 1794, he served as a private under General Herkimer and in August 1777 at Oriskany was wounded in the left arm by buckshot. His claim was not allowed as the physician reported that the wound was of no consequence.

His name appears on a list of applicants for invalid pension returned by the District Court for the District of New York, submitted to the House of Representatives by the Secretary of War on April 25, 1794, and printed in the Amierican State Papers, Class 9, page 95.

Rank: Private

Regt: General Herkimer

Disability: Wounded in the left arm by buckshot, but of no great consequence.

When and where disabled: August 1777, Oriskie.

Residence: Montgomery County.

Remarks: There are no militia rolls in this office.

Evidence transmitted by the District Court incomplete. By the physician's certificate this wound is of no

consequence.
