

Pension Application for Cornelius Bogart

W.23650 (Widow: Sarah) January 27, 1788 Mary Fraier married Cornelius Bogart Junr. Cornelius died July 22, 1811.

Dauter Jinny born 1790, January 22.

Is born my second dauter and dye the 17 of March.

1791 March the 22 is born my first son.

1793 Cornelius February 10 is born my third dauter Mary.

Declaration. In order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress of the 7th July 1838, entitled "An act granting half pay and pensions to certain widows."

County of Dutchess SS.

On this fourteenth day of June one thousand eight hundred and forty one, personally appeared in open court before the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas of said county now sitting being a court of record, having by law a clerk and a seal, Sarah Bogart a resident of the town of Marbletown in the County of Ulster and State of New York, aged seventy one years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on her oath, make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress, passed July 7th 1838 entitled "An act granting half pay and pensions to certain widows."

That she is the widow of Cornelius Bogart who was a private in the militia of the State of New York, in the service of the United States in the Revolutionary War.

She farther declares that she was married to the said Cornelius Bogart on the twenty seventh day of January, one thousand seven hundred and eighty eight—that her husband, the aforesaid Cornelius Bogart, died on the twenty second day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eleven—that she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service, but the marriage took place previous to the first of January 1794, viz at the time above stated—and for proof of the services of her said husband in said war, she would refer to the documentary evidence herewith transmitted, signed by W.W. Tredway, Deputy Comptroller of the State of New York, as also to the affidavits hereto annexed. (Signed with her mark) Sarah Bogart

Ulster County SS.

John Bogart of Marbletown in said County being sworn say, that he is seventy one years old—that his brother Cornelius, (who was the husband of Sarah Bogart, at present an applicant for a pension) died in July 1811—that said deponent will recollects that his said Brother Cornelius in the latter part of the Revolutionary War, did serve on the frontiers in Ulster County, in the Company of Capt. Gilbert Livingston's, in Col. Weisenvelts' Regiment—that his said brother was stationed at the house of Philip Houghtling in the town of Kingston in said county—said deponent well recollects that season his said brother came home on Furlough, being lame with Boils and remained home about two weeks, when said deponent, took his said brother to said Houghtlings (a distance of about 9n miles) on horseback—said deponent also recollects that late in the fall of said season, said company of Capt. Livingston was discharged at Marbletown. That a day was appointed for the distance of said company, and said deponent thinks went there, with many other to see said company discharged—and saw his brother discharged, and came home with him—has heard his said brother frequently tell of being in the 8 month service and believes he alluded to the above service under Capt. Livingston—has also heard his said brother tell of having served at Fishkill under Col. Hathorne; and speak of the bad feeling that existed there, between the New York and Eastern Troops—has also heard his said brother frequently tell of his

services under Capt. Noses Cantine, in Col. Malcom's Regiment but said deponent cannot tell in what years he served under said Col. Malcom or for what length of time. (Signed) John Bogart.
