

### **Pension Application for Daniel Brodhead or Broadhead**

W.23690 (Widow: Blandina) Married March 1, 1778, Reformed Protestant Dutch Church of Kingston, Ulster County, NY. Daniel died August 10, 1831. He was Sergt. & Ensign in Captain Hardenburgh's company and Col. Pawling's regiment. New York Line. 8 months Sergeant, 1 month & 21 days as Ensign. State of New York  
Ulster County SS.

Cornelius Quick of the Town of Rochester in the County of Ulster and State of New York being sworn says that he is in the eightieth year of his age, that in the time of the Revolutionary War, before and since, he was well acquainted with Daniel Brodhead, late of Marbletown, County and State aforesaid deceased—that in the year 1776 said deponent did serve in New York, on Long Island and White Plains in the Continental Army in a company commanded by Capt. Cornelius Hardenburgh in Col. Cortlandt's Regiment for the Term of nine months—that he well recollects that said Daniel Brodhead did serve at that time at said place in a company commanded by Capt. Hasbrouck in Col. Levi Pawling's Regiment for the term of five months—recollects that said Regiment of Col. Pawling came to New York some time in the summer—said deponent had then been there since early in the spring—believes and thinks that said Brodhead came to N. York in the service, some time in the month of August, and remembers that they continued there till in the winter.

Said deponent farther swears that in said service is N. York he has frequently seen said Daniel Brodhead on duty, and that he did serve as Orderly Sergeant, for said term of five months.

Said deponent further swears that in the year 1777 he said deponent and said Daniel Brodhead did serve for the term of three months in the company commanded by Capt. Charles Brodhead in Col. Graham's Regiment – the company mustered some time in the summer, thinks just before harvest, and went on board of a sloop to Albany – from there to we marched to Schenectady – from thence to Van Schaick's Island, where we were encamped till about the first of September, when we marched on to Stillwater—said company was in an engagement in storming a Hessian Block House—when John J. Roosa one of the company was wounded—in the main battle Col. Graham's Regiment was kept in reserve in the edge of the woods, and we were in plain sight and heard the cannon balls whistling about us—said deponent says that in said campaign the said Daniel Brodhead served in the same company with said deponent, and did serve as orderly sergeant of said company—after the surrender of Burgoyne said deponent and said Daniel Brodhead together with the rest of said company were marched to Albany and where there discharged after leaving said term of three months. Personally appeared before me Samuel Stilwell one of the Judges of Ulster County Courts, Blandine Brodhead a resident of the town of Marbletown in said County and State aforesaid aged eighty four years who being duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make the following supplemental declaration.

That she is the widow of Daniel Brodhead as stated in a former declaration. She further declares on her oath that her husband the said Daniel Brodhead was appointed a deputy purchasing commissary in February 1779 and acted in that capacity until the end of the war. She further declares on her oath the reason why she did not state this in her former declaration is that her attorney informed her at that time that for such services they were not entitled to pay but now she claims an increase of her pension for those services under the act of Congress of July 4<sup>th</sup> 1836.

She further declares on her oath that since the war she has frequently heard her husband the said Daniel Brodhead say that he had never received any pay for services done as Deputy purchasing commissary.

She further declares that she has handed to T. C. McEwin her agent the appointment and other papers showing that he acted as Deputy purchasing commissary and the said papers have always remained in her possession since the death of her said husband. (Signed with her mark) Blandine Brodhead
