

**Pension Application for Edward Currin or Curren**

W.4168 (Widow: Olive) Married March 4, 1798, Edward died September 15, 1849.

Currin's file is 110 pages long.

County of Lycoming SS. [Pennsylvania]

On the 10<sup>th</sup> day of May AD 1823, personally appeared in open court being a Court of Record for said County, Edward Currin, resident in said County aged sixty three years who being first duly affirmed according to law doth on his solemn oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the act of the 18<sup>th</sup> of March 1818, the first of May 1820, and the first of March 1823, that he the said Edward Currin enlisted for and during the term of the Revolutionary War, on the 1<sup>st</sup> of March 1777, in the State of New York in the Company commanded by Captain Samuel Sacket in the Regiment commanded by Col. Henry B. Livingston in the line of the State of New York on the Continental establishment that he continued to serve in the Corps until the end of the war, when he was discharged from the said service in the County in the State of New York.

And I do solemnly affirm that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> march 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an Act of congress, "Entitled an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and Naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> march 1818 and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the Schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed, that since the exhibition of my first schedule there is a change made of my property to wit all the property heretofore returned was sold Joseph Cooly on the [blank] day of December 1822 for debt, which amounted to two hundred twenty five dollars. (Signed) Edward Currin

I have no trade and from age and infirmities not able to perform any labour. I have a family of eleven children, seven of whom live with me and are under age. I have a wife but she being also old and infirm and unable to assist me to procure a livelihood. (Signed) Edward Currin
