

## **Pension Application for Henry Francisco or Fransisco**

Declaration.

I Henry Francisco of the Town of Whitehall in the County of Washington and State of New York do according to the act of Congress of the United States of America entitled and "Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary War", make the following declaration under oath, that is to say—I do solemnly Declare that I am a resident citizen of the United States and that I was such on the eighteenth day of March last.

To wit in the Town County and State aforesaid and that by reason of my reduced circumstances in life I am in need of assistance from my Country for support. I do further declare that I was a private soldier in the War of the revolution and that I served as such in the said War against the Common Enemy for the Term of one year and two months during the said War on the Continental establishment—That I belonged to the company commanded by Captain Jeremiah Burroughs in the [blank] Regiment commanded by Col. Seth Warner in the line of or raised principal in the Territory now Vermont, & called Green Mountain Boys.

And I do further declare that I entered into the said service on or before the first day of March in the Year of our Lord one thousand and seven hundred and Seventy Seven and left the aid service on or about the first of May—in the Year one thousand seven hundred and seventy eight having left the same by means of lameness which rendered me unfit for duty—

And I do further Declared that I was honorably discharged by Col. Seth Warner from the aid Service for the cause aforesaid. And not considering my discharge of any further consequences have many years since carelessly mislaid the same whereby it has become lost or destroyed.

And I do further Declare that I hereby relinquish all claim to any and every pension allowed me by the Laws of the United States or any individual State previous to the eighteenth day of March last.

Letter in folder dated November 21, 1934, written in response to an inquiry.

The record of Henry Francisco which follows was obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, S.44864, based upon his service in the War of the Revolution.

The date and place of birth of this soldier are not shown, nor are the names of his parents given.

He enlisted March 1, 1777 and served as a private in Captain Jeremiah Burroughs' company, Colonel Seth Warner's regiment, was discharged May 1, 1778.

He was allowed pension on his application executed April 15, 1818, at which time he was living in Whitehall, Washington County, New York, and stated that he was one hundred and thirty years of age.

He referred in 1820 to his wife, Ruth, aged seventy-four years, and to his son-in-law, Robert Willson, with whom he then lived in Whitehall, New York. A daughter, her name not given, was referred to in 1852 then living in Monroeville. The soldier died October 25, 1820. No further family data.
