The data which follow are found in the papers on file in the claim for bounty land based upon service in the Revolutionary War of James Gardner.

James Gardner was the son of Job Gardner and his wife, Hannah, who resided in Stephentown, Rensselaer County, New York; the date and place of birth of James, and his residence at the time of the Revolutionary War are not shown.

James Gardner was commissioned January 1, 1777, Adjutant of Colonel Crane's Regiment of Artillery, and was commissioned January 22, 1780, Captain-Lieutenant of the 3rd Battalion of Artillery and was in service at the close of the war; he was in the first campaign at Boston, no other details regarding his service given.

This officer resided in New Hanover County, North Carolina, and died prior to October 1816; the date and place of his death are not shown. He was not survived by children.

Gardner of Troy, Rensselaer County, New York; Mary (Gardner) Howard, the wife of Jonathan Howard, of Stephentown; New York; Phebe (Gardner) Howard, the wife of Josiah Howard, also of Stephentown; Betsy or Elizabeth (Gardner) Sheldon, the wife of Benjamin Sheldon, also of Stephentown; Hannah (Gardner) Udell, the wife of Lionel Udell, of Greenburgh, New York.

Daniel Gardner and the other brother and sisters of James Gardner were allowed 200 acres of bounty land on warrant #668, on account of his services as an officer in the Revolutionary War; the warrant for this land was issued February 25, 1817.
