

### **Disability for Richard Garrison**

Letter in folder dated September 22, 1914, written in response to an inquiry.

In response to your letters dated the 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> instants, you are advised that the records of this Bureau show that 3200 acres of bounty land was allowed under Warrant No. 98 which; issued March 3<sup>rd</sup> 1797, on account of the Revolutionary War services of Captain James Buxton of Massachusetts.

In the report from the Secretary of War in relation to the Pension Establishment of the United States, which was printed in 1835 on the list of invalid pensioners who had been in receipt of pensions at the New York Agency, whose residence could not be ascertained in consequence of the destruction of the papers in the War Office in 1801 and 1814, appears the name of Richard Garrison, a Quartermaster, annual allowance \$78. This Bureau has no further data in its files relative to either of the above soldiers, owing to the burning of the War Office in 1801, and the destruction of the papers when the British burned Washington in 1814.
