

**Pension Application for Abraham Godwin**

Abraham Godwin of Patterson, in the County of Essex, in the State of New Jersey has applied to the Secretary of the Treasury for the benefits of the act, entitled "An Act for the relief of certain surviving officers and soldiers of the Revolution", approved the 15<sup>th</sup> of May, 1828. He states that he enlisted in the Continental line of the army of the Revolution, for and during the war, and continued until its termination, at which period he was a Fife Major in Col. VanCortland's (the 2d) regiment of the New York line; and that he received a certificate for the reward of eighty dollars, provided by the resolve of the 15th of May 1778; and further, that he was not on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of May, 1828, on the pension list of the United States, and that he has received as a pensioner since the 3d of March 186, nothing.

It appears by the records in this office, that a certificate for the reward of eighty dollars has been issued to Abraham Goodwin in the New York line.
