

Pension Application for Timothy Green

On the twentieth day of April 1820, before the subscriber one of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas in and for the aforesaid country personally appears Timothy Green aged fifty five years, residing in the town of [?] who being by me first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War.

That the said Timothy Green in the month of November 1778 enlisted for three years, at Saratoga in the State of New York in a company of infantry commanded by Capt. Piersons and Regiment commanded by Col. VanDyck, from Saratoga & marched to Fort Stanwix and remained there three months, from thence he marched to Albany & from Albany to West Point, where he remained [full?] one year under the command of General Putnam, that he marched to Yorktown and was at the siege of [?] that at Yorktown he enlisted during the war—from Yorktown he went to New Jersey and remained during the during the winter—from thence he went to West Point and from thence to NewBurgh in the State of New York when he was honorably discharged—that in the whole he served three years and seven months.

That his discharge was signed by Gen. Washington, but is lost. And that he is in reduced circumstances and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support, and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said service or of his said honorable discharge. (Signed with his mark) Timothy Green.
