To the Hon. Richard Ricker Recorder of the City of New York and one of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas, called the Mayor's Court of the City of New York, which is a Court of Record of the State of New York.

The Declaration under oath of Isaac Hadley formerly a soldier engaged in the United States during the Revolutionary War, now a citizen of the United States and resident of the City and County of New York respectfully sheweth, that the said Isaac Hadley sometime in the fall of 1776 was enlisted in Capt. Robert Johnsons Company for three months then entered as a volunteer in Capt. Blanches Company on the lines for seven months afterwards in the spring of 1777 enlisted in Capt. Jonathan Lawrences Company for nine months then discharged and enlisted in Capt. Bowen's Company in 1780 as a sergeant and was appointed a lieutenant in said company, in the same year and continued in that capacity until June 1783.

And the declaration further showeth that the said Isaac Hadley is now a citizen of the United States resides in the City of New York and is by reason of his reduced circumstances in life, in need of assistance from his Country for support being very poor and sixty seven years of age and upwards.

Therefore the said Isaac Hadley conceives himself entitled to the benefit of the Act of Congress of the United States, entitled "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War" approved 18th March 1818, and requests your honor will examine into the truth of the matter aforesaid, certify and transmit the testimony in the case, and the proceedings had thereon to the Honorable Secretary of the Department of War to the end that such relief may be had in the premises as is by law in such case made and provided. And in support of the facts above set forth, the said Isaac Hadley refers to the affidavit SS

City and County of New York SS. Isaac Hadley of the City and County of New York being duly sworn saith, that the matters by him set forth in the foregoing are in all respects just and true. (Signed) Isaac Hadley.

Letter in pension folder dated December 29, 1938, written in response to an inquiry.

Reference is made to your letter relative to Isaac Hadley who served in the Revolutionary War.

The data contained herein were obtained from the papers on file in the Revolutionary War claim for pension, S.44902, based upon the military service of Isaac Hadley in that war.

The date and place of birth and the names of the parents of Isaac Hadley are not shown.

While a resident of Rockland County, New York, Isaac Hadley enlisted in the fall of 1776 and served three months in Captain Robert Johnson's New York Company. He then enlisted and served seven months in Captain Blanck's New York Company. He enlisted in 1777 and served nine months as sergeant in Captain Jonathan Lawrence's Company, Colonels Dubois' and Miles Hughes' New York Regiments. He enlisted in 1780 and served as orderly sergeant in Captain Prentice Bowen's Company, Colonel Weissenfels' New York Regiment, in the same year

he was appointed lieutenant of said company and continued in that capacity until June 1783. He was in several skirmishes.

He as allowed pension on his application executed April 1, 1818, at which time he was about sixty-seven years old and a resident of New York, New York County, New York.

In 1822 he lived in New York City and stated that he had no wife, but lived with his son, no names were given.

He died January 14, 1836, place not stated.

Six of his children were referred to in March 1836, he names not shown.

In 1822 Isaac Hadley's brothers, Stephen Hadley was living in New Ulrecht, Kings County, Long Island, New York, and Abraham Hadley, was residing in New York City, their ages are not stated.

In 1818 one George Hadley was a resident of New York City, his age or relationship to the family not stated. There are no further family data.
