

Pension Application for Jacob Hicks

W.32390 (Widow: Polly) Jacob was born June 25, 1752, Polly was born February 16, 1764. Jacob married Polly Hand 11 July 1785. He died March 3, 1808 and she died October 24, 1841. Four children survived, Green (born October 9, 1785), Aaron (born April 22, 1791), Zachariah Hicks (born December 24, 1792), and Polly Meeker (born July 28, 1795). Hannah Hicks was born September 5, 1799, who apparently did not survive her parents.

In addition:

Jacob B. Hicks died August 23, 1816 in the second year of his age.

Nelson G. Hicks died January 17, 1823.

Sally Hicks (born April 1, 1796), wife of Aaron Hicks died November 21, 1837, in 43 year of her age.

Ann Eliza Hicks died April the 7th 1824.

Hannah Ann Hicks died November 22, 183[4 or 9

Green & Sally Hicks was married the third day of October AD 1813.

Aaron & Sally Hicks (born December 3, 1796) was married the 24 day of July 1814.

Jacob & Polly (Hand) Hicks (born February 15, 1764) was married on the eleventh day of July 1785.

Zarhariah Hicks and Charity Hicks (born July 18, 1800.were married the 12 day of Jan. 1823.

William H. Hicks was born 18th April 1815.

Green Hicks son of Jacob & Polly Hicks was born October 9th 1789.

Jacob B. Hicks son of Aaron & Sally Hicks was born 22 September 181[?].

Bounty Land Warrant Number 7224 for Private Jacob Hicks, 100 Acres, issued March 25, 1791 to David Quinton, assignee. There is still another certificate for Jacob Hicks of Montgomery County in the Township of Brutus, Lot number 99 for six hundred acres. July 18, 1790. [Town of Brutus is in Cayuga County].

On a Pay Roll of the Second New York Regiment of Artillery commanded by Colonel John Lamb 1781, Gershom Mott Capt., Jacob Hicks was listed as a Corporal and on another one dated 1781 under Captain Smith as a Sergt.

I certify that it appears by the Military Register in this office that on the 21 day of November 1776 Jacob Hicks (Corpl) enlisted in the 4th New York Regiment Capt DAVI's Company to Serve during the war. Was a Sergeant 1st Nov 1778 and was mustered to January 1782. And

I further certify that it appears by the balloting book of the commissioners of the Land Office of this State in this office that Jacob Hicks was a Sergeant in the 2d New York Regiment Capt Smith's Company at the Close of the War and that Bounty
