

## **Pension Application for Pat Hogan**

Be it remembered that one the nineteenth day of September in the year 1820 personally appeared in open court before the Judges of the same Court being a Court of Common Pleas held at the Court House in Kingston in and for the County of Ulster (which said Court is a Court of record proceeding according to the course of the Common Law with a jurisdiction unlimited in point of amount keeping a record of the proceedings and having a clerk and also having the power of fine and imprisonment) Pat Hogan of the Town of Hurley in the County of Ulster aged seventy four years who being duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provisions made by the act of Congress of the 18<sup>th</sup> March 1818 & the first of May 1820.

That he the said Pat Hogan enlisted for the term of twelve months in the month of March 1777 in the State of New York in the time of the State of New York in the service of the United States in the company commanded by Capt. Benjamin Walker in the Regiment commanded by Col. Dubois in the line of the State of New York on the Continental Establishment that he continued to serve in the said Corps until about ten months when this deponent was discharge[d] on account of sickness contracted while in the army and that he was discharged at Wilmington in the State of Delaware.

That in April of the same year that the French fleet arrived in America this deponent again enlisted in the company commanded by Capt. Andrew White in the Regiment commanded by Col. Wisenfeldt for the term of nine months that this enlistment took place at Red Hook in the County of Dutchess and State of New York and that he served faithfully during the tem aforesaid.

That this deponent was in Ft. Washington when the same was taken by the British and this deponent was also at Ft. Montgomery when the same was taken by the British.

That this deponent now has no other evidence of his said services than this declaration having long since lost—all his discharges and other documents which were in his possession and pursuance of the Act of the first of May 1820 I do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of march 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an Act of Congress entitled an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and Naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war passed the 18<sup>th</sup> day of march 1818. And that I have not nor has any person in trust for any property or securities contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in my schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed.

And this deponent further says that for two years last past he has been supported as a pauper of the Town of Hurley that he has no family his wife being dead

and his other children living in different parts and not being possessed of more property that to support themselves and families.

And this deponent further says that he now is and for more than three years past has been afflicted with diseases & particularly Rheumatism so that he is wholly unable to do any labour to support himself and further that this deponent made his first declaration under the Act of 1818 in June 1818 before Abraham Hoffman one of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas for Ulster County which declaration was forwarded to the Secretary of War by mail but which from advices from that officer never was there received. (Signed with his mark) Pat Hogan.

Schedule of real estate—none in possession remainder or Reversion of Personal Estate.

One great coat, two common coats, two vests, two shirts, two pair of Pantaloons, one hat, 1 pair stockings one pair of shoes & no other property whatever. (Signed with his mark) Pat Hogan

Letter in folder dated July 24, 1937, written in response to an inquiry.

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the record of Patt [sic] Hogan, Revolutionary War pensioner in New York State, also, any other pensioners with that surname of Dutchess of Ulster County, New York.

The record of Pat Hogan is furnished you herein as found in pension claim, S.43699, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War.

The date and place of birth and names of the parents of Pat Hogan are not shown.

Pat Hogan enlisted in the State of New York and was at Fort Washington when that fort was taken by the British; no details of this service given. He enlisted in March, 1777, served in captain Benjamin Walker's New York Company, after serving ten months was taken sick and discharged at Wilmington, Delaware; he was at the taking of Fort Montgomery; in April of the year the French fleet arrived in America, he enlisted again at Red Hook, New York, and served nine month sin captain Andrew White's Company, Colonel Weissenfels' New York Regiment; soldier stated that he was discharged about September 1, 1781, by Colonel Dubois at a place opposite West Point; no details of his last service are given.

He was allowed pension on his application executed in June, 1818, while residing in Ulster County, New York.

In 1820, he stated that he was aged seventy-four years, that his wife was dead and his children were living in "different parts". Soldier was then a resident of Hurley, Ulster County, New York. He did not give the name of his wife or names of his children.
