

Pension Application for Philip Judd

(Former Widow: Mary Parkhurst) This woman also married Nathaniel Brown, William Jewett and John Parkhurst, all of whom are alleged to have served in [the] Revolution. Mary and Philip Judd married about 1763.

Letter in folder dated October 3, 1925, written in response to an inquiry. There is no deposition by the soldier or widow.

I have to advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim R.7957 it appears that on February 14, 1844, Liberty Judd, a resident of Bethany, Genesee County, New York aged sixty-eight years, applied for pension in behalf of himself and Ira Judd and Phebe Hays the only living children of Philip Judd, and stated that his father enlisted in 1776, served a few months and was killed in a battle near New York in September 1776, no officers or further details of service given.

He also stated that his father married about 1763, Mary Peters. In 1773 she was living in Kent, Litchfield County, Connecticut. About one year after the death of his father, his mother Mary married Nathaniel Brown a Revolutionary War soldier who died about 1804. They had no children.

Then in about a year, she married William Jewett a Revolutionary War soldier who died about 1808. They had no children. In 1813 she married John Parkhurst also a Revolutionary War soldier who died about 1824 without issue. She died January 20, 1838, aged ninety-five years, at the home of her son said Liberty Judd.

The claim for pension was not allowed as the son failed to furnish any proof of the alleged service of his father, as required by the pension laws.

There are no claims on file on account of the services of the said soldier, Nathaniel Brown, William Jewett and John Parkhurst.
