

### **Pension Application for John Ladew or Ladow**

W.20393 (Widow: Mary) John and Mary were married June 1783. John died December 25, 1821. Mary died March 8, 1846. Children: Uriah, Daniel, Peter, Joseph, John, Abraham, William, Isaac, Richard, George, Elizabeth, Mary, Rebecca, Margaret, Phebe & Lucinda.

State of New York

Onondaga County SS.

On this twenty second day of April 1818, before me the subscriber, First Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, in and for the said county of Onondaga, personally appears John Ladew aged fifty nine years, resident in the town of Ohio in the said county, who being by me first duly sworn, according to law, doth on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war:" That he the said John Ladew enlisted in April in the year 1780 as a private soldier for nine months at Fishkill in the state of New York in the company commanded by Captain Williams of the New York Levies; that he continued to serve in the said corps, or in the service of the United States until the tenth of December 1780 when he was discharged from service in Albany in the State of New York that he was the fore part of the season on the Mohawk River & on the Northern frontier & about the middle of July he enlisted out of the Levies into Captain Grays company in Wysenvelts Regiment and proceeded immediately to the main army at Pyramus [?] on the Hudson River & was there when Andre was executed—after which he marched to Fort [?] & from there returned to Albany & was discharged at the expiration of nine months & fifteen days from the time of his enlistment—

And that he is in reduced circumstances, and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support; and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said services.

That in the year 1781 he enlisted for one year under Captain [?] in the Quarter Master's department at Fishkill Barracks and was in constant service in said department until the first of April 1781, when he was discharged. That Colonel Hughes was stationed there & was at the head of that department at that place all the time.

That he has no other evidence of said service now in his power. (Signed with his mark) John Ladew

Sworn to & declared before me the day & year aforesaid. Joshua Forman.

I, Joshua Forman First Judge &c as aforesaid do certify, that it appears to my satisfaction that the said John Ladew did serve in the Revolutionary War, as stated in the preceding declaration, against the common enemy; and I now transmit the proceedings and testimony taken and had before me, to the Secretary for the Department of War, pursuant to the directions of the aforementioned act of Congress.
