His name appears on a list of applicant's for invalid pension returned by the District Court for the District of New York, submitted to the House of Representatives by the Secretary of War on April 25, 1794, and printed in the American State Papers, class 8, Page 94.

Rank: Private

Regt. Col. Willett's (1)

Disability: Had his feet frozen and lost some of his toes.

When disabled: February 1783 (2)

Residence: Canajoharrie

Remarks: This man appears on the regiment rolls for 1783. (3)

Evidence transmitted by the District Court incomplete, viz: No proper evidence of this claim, except his reason why he did not apply before.

End Notes—No Papers—John Malone

1. On a Register of Recruits for Colonel Marinus Willett's Regiment of New York State Levies John enlisted as a private on September 14, 1782 for 2 years.
2. In 1783, John served as a private in Captain Jellis A. Fonda's Company in Colonel Willett's Regiment for 10n months. He had been paid £40. . 0. .0. Captain Fonda retired from the service on October 31, 1783 and John was transferred to Captain Jonathan Pearsy's company in Willett's regiment and served two more months. In February of 1783, Colonel Willett led an expedition to capture Fort Oswego which failed. The men under Willett suffered severely from the cold and lack of provisions.
3. In 1781, a John Maloon served as a private in captain Garret Putman's Company in Willett's Regiment. It could be the same man. In 1784, Abraham TenEyck received Maloon's pay of £21. . 13. . 9.
