

Bounty Land for Isaac Moll or Mull

B.L. Wt.75064-160-55 (Widow: Agnes) Married January 5, 1799. Isaac died at Schodac April 26, 1838.

County of Rensselaer SS.

On this 28th day of October AD one thousand eight hundred & Fifty seven personally appeared before me Abraham V. Schermerhorn, a Justice of the Peace in and for said County Agnes Mull or Moll aged say 76 years, a resident of Schodac County of Rensselaer and State of New York, who being first duly sworn according to law, declares that she is the identical Agnes Mull, who is the widow of Isaac Mull—deceased, who served in the war of the Revolution from said town of Schodac in said County and State as one of the local militia of said town of Schodac, and was in actual service in said war as she believes & claims for more than 14 days, and she designates said service as having been performed under Captains Schermerhorn, VanWie, and VanValkinburgh & Staats of Schodac Militia in the regiment of Killian VanRensselaer or Beekman or both.

She has no knowledge of her said husbands services in the Revolutionary War and she states from information & belief.

That her said husband had two Brothers who served in the War of the Revolution, vis. James A. Mull and Walter Mull, one or both of whom applied for pensions for revolutionary services, and she believes her said husband saw Isaac Mull was a witness for said James A. Mull also for Benjamin Springstein & John A. VanValkenburgh, when they applied for pensions for their Revolutionary services under act of 7th June 1832, and she believes they or some or one of them in their declarations stated that her said husband served in the war of the Revolution one or more tours with them in the same company and regiment, either of which tours she claims was over 14 days and she refers to their declarations and the affidavit or affidavits made by her said husband and which are on file in the pension office in the respective declarations & applications of said James A. Mull, Benjamin Springstein or John A. VanValkinburgh.

That her said husband said Isaac Mull was alive in 1832, so was said James A. Mull, Benjamin Springstein & John A. VanValkenburgh above mentioned.

The does not know that Walter Mull applied for a pension, but if he did she also refers to his papers on file at the pension office for any allegations his declaration & proofs may contain of her said husband's said services, said Isaac, James A. & Walter Mull, Benjamin in Springstein & John A. VanValkinburgh were all living when the act of 7th June 1832 was passed in Congress & all lived in or near said town of Schodac when they died & all were acquainted with each other at the time of their deaths & all are dead.

That she was married to the said Isaac Mull at the town of Schodac County of Rensselaer & State of New York on the 5th day of January 1799 and that said Isaac Mull died at Schodac aforesaid on the 26th day of April 1838.

They were married by the Rev'd Mr. Berk or Burke a minister of the Reformed Dutch Church in Schodac aforesaid.

That her maiden name was Agnes McGee. She makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the Bounty Land to which she may be entitled under act of 3d March 1855 & 14th May 1857. That she has not theretofore applied for nor received any Bounty Land under this or any other act of Congress.

Said Declarant further claims that her said husband served in Daniel Schermerhorn's company the several tours mentioned in John A. VanValkinburgh's application, and one tour to Schoharie County in said State with Captain VanWie & Staats.

The several tours of service were on to Schoharie one to Schenectady, one to Stoney Arabia & Stillwater—also at Schenectady, in all four different tours of service and each of said 4 different tours was as many as 14 days service in the war of the Revolution, John A. VanValkinburgh in his application for a pension certifies to that & she believes her said husband also testified to same thin.

That Walter Mull or Moll also applied for a pension & that her said husband also was she believes testified as his Walter's witness and she also further refers to said Walter Mulls declaration & proof on file in the pension office under act of 7th June 1832, and she refers to the Certificate of the Comptroller of the State of New York hereto annexed.

That said church has long since been torn down & that there is no church at Schodac Landing where it formerly stood and she does not know of any record & she has no record of her marriage. (Signed with her mark) Agnes Mull
