

Pension Application for David Nanny

On this 3d day of September 1832, personally [appeared] in open court before the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas—now sitting appeared David Nanny of Warwick, Orange County in said state aged seventy five years, who being duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following Declaration In order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7, 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated.

Deponent saith that he was born on Long Island in August, in the year 1757, as he believes, but that he has no certain family record by whom to depose positively in reference thereto.

That he was living in said town of Warwick when he entered said service, as he believes, in the year 1776, and was marched under the command of Captain John Wisner to Fort Constitution on the East side [of] the Hudson river, at which place said company joined Colonel Newkirk's Regiment, and where they remained in said service four months.

In this service, deponent saith, that his Lieutenant was Nathaniel Ketchum, his Ensign—Asa Wisner.

Deponent further saith that in the summer of 1776, he volunteered and served under Captain William Blain, Lieutenants Thomas Sears & David Rogers, as a private soldier for the period of five months. At this time, Deponent saith, that his company was attached to Colonel Nichol's Regiment, Moses Hatfield being Major—saith that his company lay sometime at Kings Bridge, was marched from thence to White Plains, and was there in the Battle with the British Troops, in the month of October of that year. saith that after said Battle his company marched to Peekskill when deponent was verbally discharged.

Deponent further saith that he was in the service during all or part of the winter of 1777, stationed at Chloster, near the Hudson River—has forgotten the names of his officers commanding:--that in the autumn, as he believes of the following year, he served under Captain Colvin Shepard some weeks, as a soldier at Ramapo.

That he, deponent, was marched, as he thinks, in the year 1778 under said Shepard, to the Minisink frontier, on two occasions, when he served several weeks against the hostile Troops. Deponent declares that he rendered more than one year's service in the revolutionary war as a faithful soldier in the militia, and he hereby relinquishes every claim whatever, to a pension or annuity, except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state.
