

Pension Application for Isaac Newman

Montgomery County SS.

On this twenty first day of September A.D. 1832, personally appeared in open court before the Court of Common Pleas of the County of Montgomery now sitting Isaac Newman a resident of Broadalbin in the in the County of Montgomery and State of New York aged seventy two years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7, 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated. That he lived in the Town of Salem in Westchester [Westchester] County & State of New York.

That in the year 1776 he entered the service of the United States in the month of April the first day. That he volunteered for one year in said service to act as the waiter of Captain Cornelius Strugrod. That he enlisted or volunteered in the Town of Salem went from Salem to New York. There served till the fifteenth day of June when he was discharged from said service.

That he acted and served as the [porter?] of the said Captain Stingrod. That the company commanded by Captain Stingrod belonged to Col. McDougal's regiment of the State troops and that they had enlisted for one year as he believes. One Taylor was adjutant of regiment.

In the year 1777 in the month of June he was drafted for one month went to Doub's [Dobb's] Ferry & to Tarrytown came home after month was out and was drafted for one month again went on the lines between the British & Americans below White Plains near Tarrytown. Came home and was drafted again and & [sic] went back to the same place all this drafting followed each other immediately after his return and took place between the first day of June & October in said year 1777—was under Captain Thomas the two first months. The last tour he his name [sic] was Lockwood.

That he served three months at these drafts. Col. Crane commanded regiment—Major Nathaniel Delevan was in said regiment. General Cortland (Peris?) commanded the whole of the forces.

In 1778 the first of April volunteered and went into service into the company of captain Hyate thinks his name was John. Lieutenants name was Hayden, Ensigns name was Enos Legget, volunteered for nine months in state troops as he thinks they were, Col. Name was Luddington—(Henry he thinks), Ebenezeur Purdy was Major, does not recollect certainly thinks his name was John Strang, Lut. Col Name. Peris? Cortland commanded forces was stationed a part of time at Tarrytown was moved up above Peekskill and then discharged about the first of January. He served this time nine months—recollects Colo Lemuel Delevan, Thomas Sacket who commanded regiments.

Has no documentary evidence of his services. That he knows of no person whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his services or any of them.

That he was born in the town of Stamford in the State of Connecticut on the twentieth day of March 1761—Has no record of his age except what he took from the Town book of Stanford. Lived in the place first aforesaid when he was called into service. He has stated how he was called into service which was as aforesaid and the names of the officers as he recollects them.

He received a discharge at the end of his nine months service which was lost by his father in the Delaware river. Colonel Luddington gave him discharge.

That he is known to the Reverend William Groom and Marcellus Weston who can testify to his character for veracity and their belief of his services as a soldier of the revolution.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state.

That he resided since the revolutionary war in said Town of Salem and in the fourth ward of Schenectady in Schenectady County and afterwards removed to Broadalbin where he now resides and resided in said town about twenty years past.
