

### **Pension Application for Samuel Pangburn**

Letter in folder dated January 5, 1939, written in response to an inquiry.

Reference is made to your request for information relative to the Revolutionary War soldier, Samuel Pangburn, who married Elizabeth.

The data which follow were obtained from papers on file in the pension claim, S.43778, based on the military service of Samuel Pangburn.

The date and place of his birth and the names of his parents are not shown.

He enlisted in 1776, place not stated, served about one year as private in Captain Edmonston's company in Colonel Goose VanSchaick's New York regiment. In December, 1776, he enlisted at Saratoga barracks in New York, as private in Captain Robert Walker's company in Colonel John Lamb's Artillery Regiment, was in the battles of Fort Stanwix and Jamestown and in the siege of Yorktown and was discharged at West Point at the close of the Revolution.

He was allowed pension on his application executed May 6, 1818, at which time he was living in Westport, Essex County, New York, and was sixty-one years of age.

In 1820 he was living in Westport at which time he stated that his wife, Elizabeth, was fifty-three years of age, and he referred to the following as members of his family: a boy, Ezekiel, aged about fourteen years, and a boy, Almeron, aged eleven years. The date of birth of Elizabeth (never referred to as Lydia) is not shown nor is her maiden name given.

The papers in this claim contain no further data relative to the family of Samuel Pangburn and the records of his office fail to show that a claim for pension was made by anyone as the widow of this soldier.
