

Pension Application for William Pangburn

On this eighth day of January one thousand eight hundred and twenty one, personally appeared in Open Court, being a Court of Record for the county of Wayne in said Territory, William Pangburn, aged sixty three years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provision made by the act of Congress, of the 18th of March 1818, and the first of May 1820.

That he the said Willaim Pangburn, enlisted to serve during the war, on or about the 15th of April 1779, in the State of New York, in the company commanded by Capt. Dunscomb, in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Weissenfelt, in the Line of the State of New York, on the Continental Establishment. That he continued to serve in the said Crops until taken prisoner by the enemy near Fort Stanwyk, and remained a prisoner till near the end of the war; that he was in the battle at Chemung and Genesee, and that he has no other evidence now in his power, of his said services.

And in pursuance of the act of the first of May 1820, I do solemnly swear, that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818, and that I have not since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of and act of Congress, entitled, "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and Naval Service of the United States, in the Revolutionary War", passed on the 18th day of March 1818, and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property, or securities, contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any property whatever except my wearing apparel. Letter in folder dated May 17, 1938, written in response to an inquiry.

Reference is made to your letter relative to William Pangburn, a soldier of the Revolutionary War.

The data contained herein were obtained from the papers on file in the Revolutionary War claim for pension, S.35023, based upon the military service of William Pangburn in that war.

The date and place of birth and the names of the parents of William Pangburn are not shown. William Pangburn enlisted in New York State, place not given, April 15, 1779, served as private in Captain Dunscomb's Company, Colonel Weissenfels' New York Regiment; was in the battles of Chemung and Genesso; was taken prisoner near Fort Stanwix and remained a prisoner until near the close of the war.

He was allowed pension on his application executed January 8, 1821, at which time he was a resident of Wayne County, Territory of Michigan, and aged sixty-three years.

He died March 10, 1852, place not stated.

There are no family data.

This is the record of the only William Pangburn, all spellings of the names searched, that is found on the Revolutionary War records of this office.
