

### **Pension Application for Zebulon Patchin**

B.L.Wt.61360-160-55 (Widow: Polly)

Letter in folder dated May 28, 1935, written in response to an inquiry.

Reference is made to your letter in which you request information in regard to Zebulon Patchin, soldier of the Revolution, who died April 26, 1847 in Clay, Onondaga County, New York.

The data which follow were obtained from the papers on file in claim for bounty land, based upon the Revolutionary War service of Zebulon Patchin.

The date and place of birth of his soldier are not shown, nor are the names of his parents given.

Zebulon Patchin enlisted in Lebanon, August 15, 1779, served as a private in Captain Gideon King's company, Colonel Robert VanRensselaer's New York regiment, was discharged November 25, 1779.

He was living in 1795 in Lebanon Springs, Columbia County, New York. He died April 6, 1847 in Clay, Onondaga County, New York.

Zebulon Patchin married June 17, 1798 in New Lebanon, New York, Polly Cohoon.

She was allowed bounty land in full satisfaction for the services rendered on her application executed, November 29, 1856, at which time she was aged seventy-four years and a resident of Clay, New York.

Zebulon Patchin and his wife, Polly, reared a large family of children, names not stated; their youngest child in 1856 was aged about forty years.

Charles W. Cohoon in 1856 was a resident of Clay, New York, and John Patchin was sixty-seven years old in 1857, then a resident of Amboy, Oswego County, New York. Their relationship to the family is not shown.
