

**Pension Application for George Phile**

On this fifth day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighteen before me the subscriber, One of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas in and for the said County of Dauphin, personally appears George Phile, lagged fifty eight years, resident near Harrisburg in the County of Cumberland, who being by me first duly sworn, according to law, doth on his oath, make the following declaration, in Congress, entitled “An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War.”

That he the said George Phile enlisted in May 1778 at Fishkill (N. York State) in the Company commanded by Captain White of the Congress Regiment commanded by Col. Moses Hazen generally known by the name of “The old Canadian Regiment”, that this company in which he enlisted was afterwards commanded by Captain Lloyd. That he continued to serve in the said Company & Regiment in the service of the United States until the termination of the war—when he was honorably discharged from service at Little Britain on the North River (New York State) in July 1783 with a badge of merit for three years faithful services—

That he was in a skirmish at Horseneck Connecticut—at Pyramus [Paramus] New Jersey and at the taking of Lord Cornwallis—that he is in reduced circumstances and stands in need of the assistance of his Country for support—and that he has now no other evidence in his power of his said services than what is herein contained &B the deposition of James Dixon.
