

Pension Application for Isaac Phillips

On this the 24th day of March A.D. 1855 personally appeared before me the subscriber A Justice of the Peace in and for the County and State aforesaid Isaac Phillips aged 93 years a resident of Clare Township County and State aforesaid who being duly sworn according to law declares that he is the identical Isaac Phillip who as a private soldier in the company commanded by Captain Andrew White in the [blank] Regiment of New York Malitia [Militia] commanded by Colonel Frederick Weissenfels in the war with Great Britain Commonly called the Revolutionary War that he enlisted at Frederickstown Dutchess County State of N.Y. some time during the summer or fall of A.D. 1781 for the term of four months and continued in actual service in said war under said Captain for the term of four months and was honorably discharged at Albany State of New York on or about the day of [blank] A.D. and that he received written certificate of discharge which he has lost.

He makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the Bounty land to which he may be entitled under the act approved March 3rd 1855, and he further states that he has never received any Bounty Land under any act of Congress or made any application other than the present. He further state that the service above mentioned does not indicate the service which he rendered in said revolutionary war and that the balance of service is not particularly sett [set] forth he not deeming it necessary for the purpose for which this application is made. Letter in folder dated January 10, 1935, written in response to an inquiry.

You are furnished herein the record of Isaac Phillips as obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, S.7311, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War.

Isaac Phillips, son of Jacob, was born March 20, 1762, in Frederickstown, Dutchess County, New York; the name of his mother was not given.

While a resident of Frederickstown, New York, he enlisted in October or November 1777, and served fifteen days as a private in Captain David Heacock's company, Colonel John Field's New York regiment. He enlisted in May, 1778, and served six weeks as private in Captain David Heacock's New York Company. He volunteered in August, 1779 or 1780, and served three months as private in Captain David Heacock's New York company, He enlisted about July or August, 1781, and served four months as private in Captain Andrew White's company, Colonel Frederick Weisenfels' New York regiment. He enlisted in January or February 1782, and served one month as private in Captain David Heacock's company, Colonel John Field's New York regiment.

After the Revolutionary War the soldier resided in Frederickstown, New York, for a time, then moved to Cairo, Greene County, New York, where he remained until about 1801 or 1802 when he moved to Greene, Chenango County, New York, and lived there until 1840, thence to Clara, Potter County, Pennsylvania.

In 1854, he was residing in Marion Township, Potter County, Pennsylvania. In 1857, he was still a resident of said Potter County, Pennsylvania.

Isaac Phillips died July 5, 1858, in Clara, Potter County, Pennsylvania, where he resided with his son, Nathan, who was born in 1785, in Dutchess County, New York, and his daughter-in-law, Sally Phillips (Nathan's wife).

In 1869, soldier's daughter-in-law, Sally Phillips, stated that she had lived in Clara Township, Pennsylvania, for thirty -five years and prior to that time in Cortland County, New York.

The name of soldier's wife is not shown in the claim.]

In 1855, one John Phillips was a resident of Clara Township, Pennsylvania, her relationship to soldier not shown.

There are no further family data given.
