

Pension Application for Timothy Ridin or Redin or Radin

Timothy Reddin a foreigner now a resident of the town of Ulysses in the County of Tompkins and state of New York being duly sworn deposes and saith that he enlisted as a private in a company commanded by Captain Rosekans in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Lewis Duboys at Fort Montgomery for three years & from thence he marched to [Buncester?] Hill & from thence to New Windsor & then to White Plains & from thence to Fishkill from thence to Schoharie went into winter quarters from thence to Johnstown & from thence to Otsego Lake from thence to Tioga Point from thence to Genesee & from thence to to [sic] Easton & from thence to New Jersey & went into winter Quarters near Morristown & received his Discharge at that place which is hereunto annexed -- & he says that he is about sixty seven years of age & has a wife & family to support & from his reduced circumstances he needs the assistance & of his country for support being destitute of the means of support & also of property.

That he is not apprised of any pension having heretofore been allowed him by the laws of the United States—

And that he hereby releases and relinquishes his claim to every pension heretofore allowed him by the law of the United States. (Signed with his mark) Timothy Reddin

Subscribed & sworn this 14th day of April 1818 before me, John Ellis, one of the Judges of Tompkins Com Pleas.

Letter in folder dates January 9, 1932, written in response to an inquiry.

Reference is made to your letter relative to Timothy Reding, a Revolutionary War soldier.

The data furnished herein are obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, S.43935, based upon the service of Timothy Ridin (the name appears also Redin and Radin) in that war.

Timothy Redin enlisted in Dutchess County, New York, (he also stated that he enlisted at Fort Montgomery), served as a private in Captain Rosekrans Company, Colonel Lewis Duboys' New York Regiment and was discharged December 30, 1779, having served three years.

He was allowed pension on his application executed April 14, 1818, at which time he was a resident of Ulysses, Tompkins County, New York, aged about sixty-seven years. The date and place of his birth are not stated. He was referred to as a "foreigner".

He died May 20, 1834.
