

Bounty Land for James Robertson

B.L.Wt.1573-100 issued Dec 4, 1829.

Letter in folder dated July 20, 1925, written in response to an inquiry.

I have to advise you that from the records of this Bureau it appears that James Robertson enlisted in 1775 and served to the close of the Revolution as a private in Colonel VanSchaick's New York Regiment. Date of discharge not stated.

On November 23, 1829, Samuel Swift, Judge of the Probate Court of Addison District, Vermont, stated under the seal of his office that Sally Robertson was the sister and heir at law of said James Robertson, "who died without leaving any heir of his own body."

On account of his services, she was allowed one hundred acres of bounty land on Warrant 1573, which issued December 4, 1829.

The dates and places of his birth and death are not on record.

This is the only James Robertson, under any spelling of that name, who served in the New York Troops, or resided in the State of New York, found on the Revolutionary war records of this Bureau.
