

## **Pension Application for John Row**

Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed the 7<sup>th</sup> June 1832.

State of New York

Ulster County SS

On the Twelfth day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty two personally appeared in open court before the judges of the Court of Common PS IN AND FOR Ulster County, being a court of record having a jurisdiction unlimited in point of amount proceeding according to the course of common law, and keeping a record of their proceedings having a clerk and seal of their own, Johannis Row, a resident of the town of Woodstock in said County of Ulster aged seventy three years. Who being first duly sworn according to law. Doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain he benefit of the act of Congress, passed 7<sup>th</sup> June 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated.

That he was born in the town of Kingston (now Saugerties) in Ulster County and State of New York in the year 1759.

That he has a record of his age in his father's family Bible.

That he lived in the Town of Woodstock Ulster County aforesaid when called into service, that he has lived there since the Revolutionary war land that he lives there now, (a place called Little Shandaken).

That on or about the last of April or first of May in the year 1776 he volunteered and enlisted in the militia service of the State of New York in the Revolutionary War in the Company known by the name of Rangers commanded by Capt. Elias Hasbroucks first Lieutenant Peter Roggin Second Lieutenant Moses Yeomans, at Kingston Ulster County Marched from there to Rochester and there served the company continued there about Two weeks then marched from there to Newburgh and continued there three months or more then marched from there to a place called Smiths Clove. Continued there three months or more as a guard to protect the grain belonging to the army which was taken from the Tories, then marched from there to Hackensack and continued there and its vicinity schoutiong [scouting] for three months or more.

Then he with said Company returned to Newburgh remained there two months or more, and then he with the said company marched from there to Kingston remained there a few days and marched from there to the western part of the county and continued engaged that part of the County of Ulster for two month or more. And was then discharged on or about the first of July 1777 and after a service of the fall term of thirteen & ½ months or more, all of which he positively swears.

That he received no written discharge

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state. (Signed) John Row.
