

## Pension Application for Peter P. Suts

State of New York

Lewis County SS.

Personally appeared before me the undersigned a Justice of the Peace in and for the County aforesaid Peter P. Suts of Lowville in said county, who being duly sworn deposeth and saith that he served in the war of the Revolution and under the officers names in his declaration hereto annexed not less than the periods mentioned below and in the following grade:

In the months of October 1780 he served fifteen days as a private in the NY Militia.

In the Spring of 1781, he served two months in the militia aforesaid as a private.

From sometime in August 1781, till sometime in December of the same year he served as a private in the N. York State Troops a term of four months.

In the spring and summer of 1782, he served three months he cannot specify the precise time of entering & leaving the service. That he served in all nine months & fifteen days and served under the officers and in the manner as specified in his declaration.

This deponent further states that no clergyman resides in the vicinity of deponent which the reason that no clergyman signed the certificate [?] to his declaration—and this deponent further states that in addition to the above service he resided in the fort in the Town of Palentine [Palatine] N.Y. at least one year and two months and did duty as a guard and otherwise a considerable part of the time.

On this twentieth day of September in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty two personally appeared in open court before the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas of the County of Lewis now sitting Peter P. Suts a resident of the Town of Harrisburgh in the County of Lewis and State of New York aged sixty eight years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7, 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated.

That in the year 1780 in the month of October as he believes, he entered the service in the New York Militia as a volunteer under Captain Henry Miller, Lieutenant and Samuel Van Atta, 2d Lieutenant Isaac Paris, in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Jacob Clock and served two or three weeks.

That in the spring of 1781 he again entered the service in the New York Militia as a Volunteer and served about two months under same officers company & Regiment above mentioned.

That in the month of August 1781, he again entered the service of the United States as volunteer in the New York State Troops under Captain Skinner, Lieutenant Eaton, in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Marinus Willet and served four months.

Also in the year 1782 he served in the New York Militia under the officers first above mentioned upwards of three months in the spring and summer. That he cannot state the precise time of entering and leaving the service as he served a number of tours each year.

The said Applicant further states that he was in the Battle at Johnstown in the year 1781.

That the above service was all rendered on the Mohawk River in the State of New York.

That he resided at the time of entering the service in the town of Palentine [Palatine], in the County of Montgomery, New York.

That he has no documentary evidence and that he knows of no person whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his service.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatsoever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state. (Signed) Peter P. Suts.

Letter dated November 7, 1929, written in response to an inquiry.

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S.14639, it appears that Peter P. Suts, while living at Palatine, New York enlisted and served as a private in the New York Troops as follows:

In October, 1780, fifteen days in Captain Henry Miller's Company, Colonel Jacob Klock's Regiment; from the spring of 1781, two months in the same company and regiment; from August, 1781, four months in Captain Skinner's Company, Colonel Marinus Willett's Regiment and was at the Battle of Johnstown; from the spring of 1781, three months in Captain Henry Miller's Company, Colonel Jacob Klock's Regiment. He did guard duty in the fort at Palatine about one year and two months.

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 20, 1832, while living at Harrisburgh, Lewis County, New York, aged sixty-eight years.

There are no data as to family.
