

### **Pension Application for George Travis**

Letter in folder dated February 8, 1940, written in response to an inquiry.

The data which follow in regard to George Travis were obtained from the papers in pension claim, R.10685, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War.

George Travis was born in 1760 in White Plains, Westchester County, New York. The names of his parents were not given.

While living in Phillipstown, Putnam County, New York, where he had lived sixty-nine years, George Travis applied November 17, 1837, for pension which might have been due on account of his service. He alleged that while a resident of Phillipstown, New York, he enlisted in July, 1777, and served four months as private in Captain Elijah Townsend's company, Colonel Henry Luddington's New York Regiment, stationed at White Plains; that he enlisted in September, 1778, and served three months as private in Captain George Lain's Company, Colonel Henry Luddington's New York Regiment; that he enlisted again in June, 1779, in the Quartermaster Department, and served six months as private under Major Campbell in Colonel Hay's regiment.

His claim for pension was not allowed as he failed to furnish proof of service of six months in accordance with the requirements of the pension laws.

It is shown in the claim whether the soldier, George Travis, ever married.

In 1837, one Daniel D. Travis was residing in Phillipstown, New York, his relationship to soldier not stated. In the same year, one Isaac Post, aged seventy-six years, was a resident of Phillipstown, New York, and testified that he served a tour of three months with George Travis from September 1778, no further details of service given, nor is the date of death of George Travis shown.
