

### **Pension Application for Isaac VanNorman**

W.19955 (Former Widow: Hannah Page) Hannah married Isaac on May 4, 1786, and Isaac died August 15, 1812. Hannah married David Page, who died June 9, 1833.

B.L.Wt. 7913-100 Issued March 14, 1793.

Widow's first husband Isaac Van Normal also served in the War of 1812.

Letter in folder dated August 30, 1935, written in response to an inquiry.

The data which follow pertaining to Isaac Van Norman were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, W.19955, based upon his service in the War of the Revolution.

The date and place of birth of this soldier are not given, nor are the names of his parents stated.

Isaac Van Norman was a private in the 2<sup>nd</sup> New York regiment, was in many battles and served until the close of the war, length of service not stated, nor are the names of his officers given.

He also, when in the forty-eighth year of his age, enlisted June 29, 1812 under Lieutenant Burr in the 23<sup>rd</sup> regiment. The enlistment was for five years, but soon after the arrival at Greenbush, New York, he was taken sick, and died August 15, 1812.

Isaac Van Norman married May 4, 1786 or 1787, Hannah Brown. She was born July 8, 1769 in Scituate, Rhode Island and was the daughter of Philip Brown, name of her mother not given. They were married at her father's home in Hoosick, Rensselaer County, New York, where he had moved in 1793.

After the death of her husband, Isaac VanNorman, the widow, Hannah, married David Page who died June 9, 1833.

She was allowed pension on account of the Revolutionary War service of her husband, Isaac Van Norman, on her application executed September 8, 1840, then a resident of Royalton, Niagara County, New York. She was living in 1844 in Warsaw, New York and in 1848 was a resident of Hartland, New York.

It is stated that the soldier, Isaac Van Norman, and his wife, Hannah reared a "numerous family of children." The name of the only child shown was Daniel Vanorman (as he signed) who in 1840 made affidavit in Niagara County, New York.

The widow's father, Philip Brown was a resident of Warsaw, New York in 1840 and then ninety-five years of age. Abram W. Brown, her brother, was sixty-seven years of age in 1844, he stated that when his sister was married to Isaac Van Norman, he was on a visit to his uncle, Caleb Parker, in Rensselaer County, New York. Thankful Spencer, the widow's sister, was living in 1844 in Luzerne, Warren County, New York, then aged seventy-seven years.
