

Pension Application for Benjamin Warner

DECLARATION.

In order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress, passed June 7, 1832.

State of New-York,

Broome County, SS.

On this 13ath day of March 1833 personally appeared in open Court, before the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas, now sitting, Benjamin Warner, a resident of Windsor in the County of Broome and State of New York, aged 70b years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress, passed June 7, 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers, and served as herein stated.

He Enlisted as a Volunteer at Waterbury, in the County of New Haven and State of Connecticut (where the applicant then resided) as a private into a Company commanded by Capt. Roswell Ransom in the month of April 1782 for the term of Eight months or during the Campaign—was mustered at Hartford and marched thence to Pempton N. Jersey where he joined his Regiment under the command of Col. Cortland of the N. York Troops—about the first of August marched with his company to Burlington N. Jersey and was there attached to Col. Lambs Regt. Of Artillery – then returned to the Highlands N.Y. about the first of September, and late in the month of December 82 was discharged – having served the full period of Eight months—no written discharge was received.—

The applicant has no documentary evidence and knows of no person (excepting Jedidiah Gaylord whose affidavit is there with exhibited) who can testify to his service—of the Regular Officers he can name Capt. Thomas & Lieut. Col. Stevens of Col. Lamb's Regiment and Gen. Knox of the Artillery who were with the troops where he served—he cannot state the names of the Continental or Militia Regiments with precision other than that in which he served.—

The applicant was Born in Waterberry N. Haven Co., Conn. In November 1762but has no record of his age.

Since the Revolutionary War lived at Waterberry until 31 years ago when he removed to Windsor Broome Co., N.Y. where he now resides.—

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the Pension Roll of the Agency of any State. (Signed) Benjamin Warner

Letter in folder dated August 10, 1928, written in response to an inquiry.

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S.11644, it appears that Benjamin Warner was born in November 1762 at Waterbury, New Haven County, Connecticut.

While residing at said place, he enlisted in April 1782 and was a private in Captain Roswell Ransom's company, marched to New Jersey and was placed in Colonel Cortlandt's New York Regiment, and in August was transferred to Colonel Lamb's Regiment of Continental Artificers, served in all eight months.

He was allowed pension on his application executed March 13, 1833, at which time he was living in Windsor, Broome County, New York.

There are no data as to family.
