

Pension Application for William Warn, Warrn, Warren, Warner

At a court of Common Pleas held at the Court-House in the village of Batavia, in and for the county of Genesee in the State of New-York; on the sixth day of September of the term of September 1820, being a Court of Record, in pursuance of the 41st article of the Constitution of the state of New-York, which has unlimited jurisdiction, keeps records of its proceedings, and has immemorially exercised the power of fine and imprisonment.

Present, the Hon. John H. [?], Richard Smith, Moses Harden, Isaac Wilson & Ralph Sarkers Judges.

Genesee County SS. On this sixth day of 1820, personally appeared in open Court, (being a Court of Record,) William Warn aged sixty six years, resident of the town of Sweden— in said county, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, declare that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows:--Six years & four months being Enlisted for during the war in the year 1777—Served in Capt. Pell's Company in Col. Courtland's 2nd N. York Regt, (1) that his original declaration was dated 2nd day of May 1818 and Certificate is numbered 5121.

And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States, on the eighteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, and that I have not, since that time, by gift sale or in any manner whatever, disposed of my property (2), or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war," passed on the eighteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, and that I have not nor as any person in trust for me, any property or securities, contracts, or debts, due to me; nor have I any income, other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed,

I have no provisions on hand I am a widower and live with my son. I am owing debts to the following persons viz.

And interest on the above \$105.00

And the deponent further says that he is a farmer by occupation but is a feeble, infirm man, not able to labor. That he has two daughters named Anna and Fanny living aged 17 years, has no wife or sons under age that he is wholly dependant on his pension for support. (Signed with his mark) William Warn.

End Notes—S.44208—William Warn

1. William is usually listed as Warren on the muster rolls of Captain Samuel T. Pell's Fourth Company in Colonel Philip VanCortlandt's Second New York Continental Regiment. He does not appear on the muster rolls until January of 1781 as a Corporal. FROM: Revolutionary War Rolls 1775-1783, Series M-246, Roll 68, Folder 29, National Archives, Washington, D.C. According to his discharge it appears that he served at least six years in the Continental Service. A William Warren enlisted as a private in Captain John Hunter's Company in Colonel William Malcolm's Additional Continental Regiment on May 3, 1777 for *during war*. In May of 1779, Colonel Malcolm's Regiment was consolidated with Colonel Oliver Spencer's Additional Continental Regiment. As William was enlisted for *during war* he would have been transferred to this regiment. Colonel Malcolm now retired from the Continental service. On January 1, 1781, Colonel Spencer's Regiment was consolidated with the New Jersey Continental Line and the men from the State of New York was sent to join one of the two remaining New York Regiments. Although William never relates any other Continental Service but claimed to have served six years which his discharge verifies.
2. William on July 8, 1790 was allotted 500 acres in Township 21, Lot 39, for his service. FROM: The Balloting Book and other Documents Relating To Military Bounty Lands In The State of New York, Albany, New York, Printed by Packard & Van Benthysen, p 45, 1825.
