

Pension Application for George Weaver

On this seventeenth day of April 1818 before me the subscriber one of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas for Ulster County personally appears George Weaver aged 67 years resident in the Town of Saugerties in the said county of Ulster, who being by me first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress Entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged I the Land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war".

That he the said George Weaver enlisted in Westchester in the State of New York in the fall of the year 1776 in the company commanded by Captain William Craig does not know the number of the Regiment but he belonged to General VanSchaick's Brigade, that he continued to service in the said Corps, or in the service of the United States until the closing of the war when he was discharged from service in Albany in the State of New York.

That he was in the Battles of Orisa and that he is in reduced circumstances and stand in need of the assistance of his country for support, and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said services. (Signed with his mark) George Wever [Weaver]

Letter in folder dated September 22, 1923, written in response to an inquiry.

I have to advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S.43978, it appears that George Weaver enlisted at Westchester, New York the fall of 1776 as a private in Captain William Craig's company, colonels Van Schaick and Gansevoort's New York regiment, and served until the close of the war. He as in the battle of Oriskany.

He was allowed pension on his application executed April 17, 1717, while a resident of Saugerties, Ulster County, New York, aged sixty seven years.

In 1920, soldier was living in Espous, Ulster County, New York, and stated that he had never married.
