

Pension Application for Cornelius Winne

On the Twelfth day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty two personally appeared in open court, before the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas in and for the County of Ulster, now sitting, proceeding according to the course of the Common Law, with a Jurisdiction unlimited in point of Amount, and keeping a Record of their proceedings, having a clerk and seal of their own, Cornelius Winne a Resident of the town of Kingston in the County of Ulster aged Seventy years, who being first sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7, 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States, under the following named officers, and served as herein stated.

And the said Cornelius Winne declares that he volunteered as a private soldier in the United States service in the Revolutionary war for "Nine" months in the year 1777, and served during the whole of the said Nine months in the Company commanded by Captain John L. DeWitt, Lieutenant Peter Post and Ensign Isaac Post all of the town of Saugerties in the County of Ulster deceased, in the Regiment Commanded by Colonel Pawling, that he was stationed at Shandaken in the Picket fort around the house of one Jacob Longyear.

That he said Service commenced in the beginning of the month of April and ended in the beginning of January following, that during the whole a'said term of service he was engaged ranging the frontiers from one frontier post to another on the Northwestern bounds of Ulster County of Ulster, that he did not receive any written discharge from said service, and has no documentary evidence thereof, that there were no regular officers with the troops in this service, nor any Continental or Militia Regiments except the Militia Regiment of Colonel Pawling in which he served, and that for proof of this service nor any Continental or Militia Regiments except the Militia Regiment of Colonel Pawling in which he served, and that for proof of this service he begs leave to refer to the affidavit of Wilhelmus France a living witness hereunto annexed.

1. And the said Cornelius Winne declares that he was born on the 15th day of August in the year 1762 in the town of Kingston in the county of Ulster and State of New York.
2. That he has no record of his age.
3. That at the time he was called into service he lived in the Northern part of the town of Kingston no [now] called Saugerties that he has lived there since and now lives in the Village at Kingston in said County & State.
4. That he volunteered into said service.

5. That there were no Regular Officers with the troops where he served.

Her hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or Annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State. (Signed with his mark) Cornelius Winne

Letter in folder dated March 23, 1939, written in response to an inquiry.

Reference is made to your request for information relative to Cornelius Winne, a soldier of the Revolutionary War.

The data which follow were obtained from papers on file in the pension claim, S.14841, based on the military service of the only Cornelius Winne that is found in the Revolutionary War records of this office.

Cornelius Winne was born August 15, 1762, at Kingston, Ulster County, New York. The names of his parents are not shown.

While living in the northern part of Kingston, which was later Saugerties, he enlisted in April, 1777, and served until January, 1778, as private in Captain John L. DeWitt's company in Colonel Pawling's New York regiment.

He was allowed pension on his application executed December 12, 1832, at which time he was living in Kingston, New York.

Reference was made to Cornelius Winne's brother, Peter, who also served in the Revolutionary War. There are no further data relative to the family of Cornelius Winne.
