

## **Pension Application for Peter J. Winne**

S.11835

Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed the 7<sup>th</sup> June 1832.

State of New York

Ulster County SS

On the thirteenth day of September in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty two personally appeared in open Court before the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas in and for the county of Ulster being a court of record of said County, proceeding recording to the course of Common Law, with a Jurisdiction unlimited in point of Amount and keeping a Record of their proceedings, having a clerk and seal of their own, Peter J. Winne, a resident of the town of Saugerties in the County of Ulster aged seventy three years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed the 7<sup>th</sup> June 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following name officers and served as herein Stated: To Wit

That on or about the first of May in the year 1777 he volunteered as a private soldier in the Service of Militia of the State of New York in the Revolutionary war in the Company of Capt Henry Schoonmaker in Colonel Snyder's Regiment for Three months as a substitute for his Father (who had already served one month in a Four months service) for the residue of his Four Months Service, rendezvoused at Saugerties Ulster County and went from there by water to Fort Montgomery and continued there under the command of Genl Clinton untill about the first of August following and was then there discharged.

And this applicant further declares that immediately after the last above service in the fall of 1777 he again volunteered as a private soldier in said service of the State of New York in the Company of Capt Philip Swart in Major John Cantine's Regiment for three months and that the said company met at Kingston Ulster County, event from there by water to Albany, marched from there to Stillwater, was there attached to Col. Graham[s] Regiment from Dutchess County, in Gen'l Glover's Brigade and continued in said Service untill untill after the surrender of Burgoyne and then returned to Albany and then some time in the month of November following (1777) he with the said company & Regiment was discharged.

And this applicant further declares that in the Spring of the year 177 he again entered as a private soldier in said Service in Capt Matthew Dederick's Company for one month and was stationed as a frontier gaurd [guard] in the Town of Saugerties Ulster County Ulster County.

And he further declares that in the same year 1778 soon after the above service he again entered the same service as aforesaid in Capt Jeremiah Snyder's Company for Two months and was stationed as a gaurd to the Frontiers in the said town of Saugerties.

And he further declares that the same year 1778 and soon after the above named service he again entered the same service as aforesaid, in Capt Henry Schoonmaker's Company and was stationed with said Company for Two months, at the house of Tobias Wynkoop as a frontier guard in said town of Saugerties.

And he further declares that in the same year 1778 he again entered the same service as aforesaid and soon after the last above named service in Capt John DeWitts Company Two months and was stationed as a frontier guard in the town [of] Woodstock in said County of Ulster.

And he further declares that in the fall of the same year 1778 he again entered the same service as aforesaid in Lieutenant Peer Eigner's Company for one month and was stationed as a frontier guard at Shandaken in said County of Ulster and was duly discharged.

And this applicant further declares that about on or about the first of April in the year 1779 he again volunteered as a private Soldier in the same service as aforesaid in the company of Capt Hunter in Col Albert Paulding's Regiment of rendezvoused at Marbletown Ulster County marched from there to Shandaken, built a fort around the house of one Mr. Longyear, and went from there west with an intent of Joining Genl Sullivan in his expedition against the Indians.

Then he and the company arrived near the Susquehannah River understood that a letter had been found stating that Genl Sullivan was some days in advance, being nearly out of provisions returned to Shandaken and went from there to Stoney Point continued there until some time in December following (being out of provisions) he with the said company there until sometime in January following (1780) and was then there discharged by Col Paulding in person. (Received no written discharge) making nine months service.

And this applicant further declares that in the spring of the year 1780 he again volunteered as a private soldier in the same service as aforesaid in the Company of Lieut Peter Post for one month, and was stationed in the town of Woodstock in Ulster County as a guard to the Frontiers, and was there discharged (but received no written discharge).

In answer to the first interrogation he says.

That he [was] born in the Town of Saugerties Ulster County in the year 1759.

To the 2d That has no record of his age.

3. That he lived at the time he entered the service and that he has lived since the Revolutionary war and still lives in the Town of Saugerties aforesaid.

4<sup>th</sup> That he always volunteered (or as he calls it) enlisted except the first service when he was a substitute for his father.

And to the 5<sup>th</sup> That he knows none but those mentioned in this his declaration.

To the 6 That he does not recollect of having received a written discharge at any time.

To the 7 [blank]

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a Pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the Pension Roll of any agency in any state. (Signed with his mark) Peter J. Winne
