

Pension Application for John Younglove

S.26972 Major, NY Regt, Colo Van Voort.

To the Hon's J.C. Calhoun, Secrety of War.

Sir/By an act passed at the Second Session of Congress entitled [entitled] An act for the relief of disabled Soldiers and Seamen lately in the service of the United States & of certain other persons & Approved August 11th 1790 I was allowed a pention [pension] at the rate of six dollars per month from the 30th day of July 1781 as a disabled major in colonel Lewis VanVoort's regiment of New York militia—I have never had a certificate from the war department of my being on the Pention list, but have in every year since the passage of that law received my pention from the U.S. Pention agent in the City of New York, till last Sept'r when it was refused on the ground of the want of such certificate—and I was directed by the agent to apply to the war Department for a Certificate—

If the above mentioned Law entitles me to a certificate by which I can draw the small stipend which my Country has been pleased to allow me, by granting and forwarding it to me you will do an act of Justice to and receive the thanks of an aged infirm & disabled soldier of the Revolution. (Signed) John Younglove.

Dated at Cambridge Washington County and State of New York this 6 day of Dec'r 1820.

JOHN YOUNGLOVE—S.45486.

John Younglove enlisted about January 1, 1776, in Thompson, Windham County, Connecticut, served as private in Captain Samuel Curtiss' company, Colonel Ebenezer Learned's Massachusetts regiment, was discharged January 1, 1777, at Trenton, New Jersey and returned to Connecticut; he enlisted in 1777, and served two months as private in Captain Parley Howe's company of Connecticut cavalry.

He was allowed pension on his application executed July 6, 1818, at which time he resided in Edinburg, Saratoga County, New York. John Younglove was then aged sixty-one years the date and place of his birth and names of his parents are not shown.

In 1820, the soldier's wife, aged sixty years, and son, aged eighteen years, were living with him their names are not shown. He had a sun who resided then in Vermont, but his name was not stated.

John Younglove died July 13, 1840, survived by heirs, whose names are not shown.

John Younglove was Major of Colonel Lewis VanWoert's regiment of New York militia; his residence at the time of his commission, date of said commission and length of his service are not shown.

He was allowed pension from July 30, 1781, on account of disability incurred in service, rate \$6 per month; the nature of said disability is not shown. He was then a resident of Washington County, New York.

In December 1820, Major John Younglove was a resident of Cambridge, Washington County, New York. He died February 3, 1821.

There are no data whatever regarding the family of the above noted officer.
